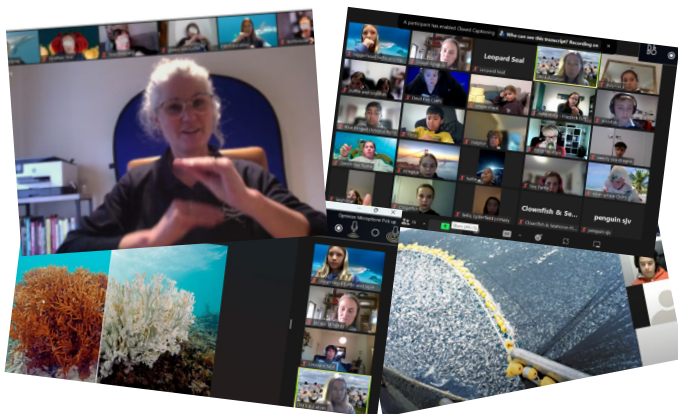

Our recorded sessions included Paleontologist Ben Francishelli and his field research on fascinating Australian fossils, Dr Prue Francis from the Queenscliff Marine Science Centre and her research on the Great Southern Reef, and finally Marine Biologist Fam Charko who presented on a community project to address the impacts of the Northern Pacific seastar in our local waters. DRI RESEARCH UPDATE ON MARINNA AND FAMILY!

In 2012, a dolphin called Jean gave birth to little Marinna. Marinna suffered a horrible injury to her back when she was only four, and it was a miracle she wasn't paralysed or killed! She seemed to heal well, with a deep scar on her back as a sign of her accident.

Then in 2021, something extraordinary happened - Marinna became a MUM! - but there is more...Marinna now has a second calf! The photo on the right shows Marinna with her new calf taken on 11 March - the calf is likely only a few weeks old! Marinna's calves are adding to the third generation of this remarkable community of common dolphins! In 2022 we recorded the birth of six calves!

The knowledge of dolphins recovering from severe injury, calving and calf survival is crucial to understanding the health of this dolphin community. Because they are top-order predators, it also reflects positively on the health of the ecosystem they rely on. The End.
