Ambassadors absolutely loved their session with the fabulous Lionel from Living Culture who wowed everyone with his talk on bush medicine, amazing show-and-tell with some amazing indigenous artefacts, and much more! Ambassadors were then treated to a barbecue in the beautiful surrounds at the Warneet Yacht Club and all made it home before the rain hit!

## RICKETTS POINT WORKSHOP SO MUCH FUN IN THE SUN!

We had a fantastic workshop at Ricketts Point for Ambassadors who missed out last term! We began the day with a rockpool ramble and Ambassadors loved searching for all the beautiful critters that call this special Marine Sanctuary their home!

Then it was on to a seagrass activity where Ambassadors searched through the microscopic world of seagrass and found animals such as centipedes, crabs, and flatworms, whilst learning about the critical importance of our seagrass habitats. Ambassadors also got hands on during the Sand Sort session racing each other to correctly identify and name the sources of a range of marine debris items buried in the sand. We then conducted a dolphin identification activity and Ambassadors raced to identify some of our resident dolphins. We were so impressed with their identification skills and strategies and their support for each other was inspiring!

Ambassadors finished off with a Climate Change game to learn about the impacts of food production, and they were surprised to learn about the hidden carbon emission costs of local to global food production and transport. We are so grateful to The City of Casey, and our ISIC teachers and parents/carers for supporting and transporting our Ambassadors to the workshops throughout the term!







## NATIONAL SCIENCE WEEK SUCCESS!!

We had some amazing presenters for National Science Week starting with Ecologist Lauren Tworowski talked about her amazing PhD research on Phillip Island's Little Penguins, including the issues they face due to land clearing and climate change and how we can help these little creatures. Next up was Joni Fitzsimmons, who discussed her Ph.D. research on ray biology, the issues threatening rays, and how we can contribute! Then it was onto Tangaroa Blue's incredible founder Heidi Tate, who discussed her journey toward developing the Australian Marine Debris Database, and the hidden issues with recycling such as recycled plastic T-shirts that shed plastic microfibers during the wash cycle. We also chatted to Kade Mills, who is the ReefWatch Coordinator at the VNPA. Kade wowed Ambassadors with all things Weedy seadragon biology, seadragon surveys and some of the associated climate change issues, and how to get involved with some fantastic seadragon citizen science projects!
