

CATCHMENT WORKSHOP WINTER FUN!

We had such a great time at our Catchment Workshops this term! Ambassadors began at Narambi Reserve with Mandy explaining how stormwater drains lead to the litter catchments to trap litter from flowing into our waterways. The awesome folks from Greenworks explained the huge costs associated with our waste and lifted the litter bags from the traps to highlight the huge volumes of litter discarded in our parks and streets.

Ambassadors participated in a Healthy Waterways Workshop with a water pollution testing lesson, and a hunt for aquatic macroinvertebrates, focusing on their pollution tolerance. Ambassadors learned how important wetland systems are to trap the pollutants not caught in litter traps such as oil, and chemicals from our lawns.

At Mornington foreshore we conducted a litter collect, sort, and report session focusing on the sources of litter. Then it was onto a Climate Change Game focusing on global emissions and the huge volumes of waste from food production. We finished off with a frog identification lesson looking at how species of frogs help determine the health of local environments alongside the issues they face such as pollution and land clearing. Thank you to our partners at the Mornington Peninsula Shire, the folks from Greenworks and Melbourne Water, and of course the ISIC teachers and parent/carers for transporting the Ambassadors to the Workshops.

RICKETTS POINT WORKSHOP SO MUCH FUN IN THE SUN!

We had a fantastic workshop for Ambassadors who missed out last term! We began the day with a rockpool ramble and Ambassadors loved searching for all the beautiful critters that call this Marine Sanctuary their home! Then it was on to a seagrass activity where Ambassadors searched through the microscopic world of seagrass and found animals such as centipedes, crabs, and flatworms whilst learning about the critical importance of our seagrass habitats. Ambassadors also got hands on during the Sand Sort session racing each other to correctly identify and name the sources of a range of marine debris items buried in the sand. We then conducted a dolphin identification activity and Ambassadors raced to identify some of our resident dolphins. We were so impressed with their identification skills and strategies and their support for each other was inspiring!

We finished with a Climate Change game, learning about the impacts of food production, and all were surprised at the hidden carbon emission costs of local to global food production. We are so grateful to the Mornington Peninsula Shire, and our ISIC teachers and parents/carers for supporting Ambassadors throughout the term!

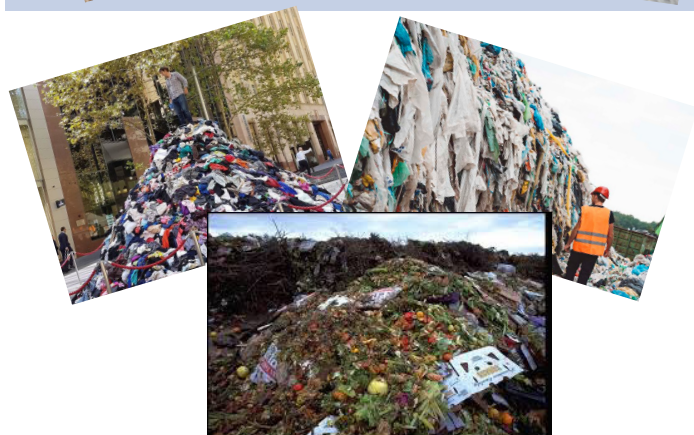




NATIONAL SCIENCE WEEK SUCCESS!!

We had some amazing presenters for National Science Week starting with Ecologist Lauren Tworkowski talked about her amazing PhD research on Phillip Island's Little Penguins, including the issues they face due to land clearing and climate change and how we can help these little creatures. Next up was Joni Fitzsimmons, who discussed her Ph.D. research on ray biology, the issues threatening rays, and how we can contribute! Then it was onto Tangaroa Blue's incredible founder Heidi Tate, who discussed her journey toward developing the Australian Marine Debris Database, and the hidden issues with recycling such as recycled plastic T-shirts that shed plastic microfibers during the wash cycle. Last but not least we chatted to Kade Mills, who is the ReefWatch Coordinator at the VNPA. Kade wowed Ambassadors with all things Weedy seadragon biology, seadragon surveys and some of the associated climate change issues, and how to get involved with some fantastic seadragon citizen science projects!
